The Rose Family (Rosaceae)

The tree has alternately arranged, oblong to ovate simple leaves; fissured, scaly, thin bark; and is shade intolerant.

Habitat: The tree is found in eastern North America, from Nova Scotia to Florida.

Interesting Facts: Black cherry seeds that pass through the digestive tract of passerine birds have higher germination rates than undigested seeds.

Fruit: The fruit is berry-like fruit; black when ripe; edible to humans and widely used in wines and jellies.

Flower: The flower is small and white with 5 petals each; and has numerous flowers found on a stalk.

Wildlife value: Many species feed on the fruit of this tree, including birds, opossums, and black bears.
