This perennial, evergreen shrub, reaching 30 feet tall has smooth gray bark with white or lighter gray spots; alternate oval-shaped leaves with slightly serrated margins. It is shade tolerant; but not fire tolerant.

Habitat: It prefers sandy soils, but can tolerate many soil types; found across southeastern U.S.

Interesting Facts: Though poisonous to humans, yaupon is the only plant native to North America that contains caffeine.

Fruit: The fruit is small, translucent, red berries that remain on tree through the winter; each berry contains 4 seeds.

Flower: The flower is small, white flowers with 4 petals; male flowers found in large clumps; and female flowers found in groups of 1-3.

Wildlife value: The berries are eaten by waterfowl, songbirds, raccoons, skunks, and many other animals. The evergreen foliage provides cover for many animals during the winter.
