Tall tree, reaching 90 feet tall at maturity with simple, alternate, deciduous leaves ranging 2.0 -4.0 inches long and 1.0 to 2.0 inches wide.

Habitat:

This tree prefers moist, upland forests and in deep sand deposits in bottomlands.

Interesting Facts:

The timber value is moderate quality because of splitting. Veneer is used as plywood for fruit and vegetable containers.

Fruit:

The nearly round acorn is 0.38 to 0.63 inches with nearly black color with faint stripes.

Flower:

Its flower is monoecious; unisexual; staminate, stalked, hairy, yellow, catkins, 2.0 to 3.0 inches long.

Wildlife value:

Acorns are eaten by squirrels, chipmunks and waterfowl.
